Eid ul-Fitr is a festival celebrated by Muslims all over the world. It marks the end of Ramadan, a holy month where Muslims fast from sunrise to sunset every day.

Eid ul-Fitr means 'Breaking of the Fast' and is celebrated on the first day of the month of Shawwal in the Islamic calendar. It is a time for Muslims to come together with family and friends to enjoy good food, exchange gifts, and spread joy.

In 2023, Eid ul-Fitr is expected to be on April 21st, and in 2024, it is expected to be on April 9th.

To wish someone a Happy Eid, you can say 'Eid Mubarak' which means 'Blessed Celebration'. Muslims are also encouraged to give charity, known as Zakat ul-Fitr, to those in need before the Eid prayer.

After the prayer, Muslims visit their relatives and friends to wish them a happy Eid and often exchange gifts or sweets.

The date of Eid ul-Fitr changes each year because it follows the Islamic calendar, which is based on the cycles of the moon. This means that Eid ul-Fitr moves forward by around 10 to 11 days each year in relation to the Gregorian calendar.
